

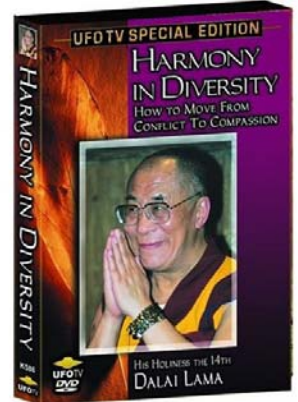

***Philadelphia Regional Unity Conference: Unlearning Sexism and Racism***

A nationally acclaimed lecturer and trainer, Lee Mun Wah is the Executive Director and founder of StirFry Seminars. He is a Chinese American community therapist, documentary filmmaker, educator, performing poet, Asian Folk teller and author.

In 1993 his first film on Asian Americans, *Stolen Ground*, won the San Francisco International Film Festival's Certificate of Merit Award for Best Bay Area Documentary. His second film, *The Color of Fear*, won the National Education Media Network's Best Social Documentary Award for 1995. In 1998 *Walking Each Other Home* won the Cindy International Film Festival's Silver Medal for Best Social Issues Award. In 1995 Oprah Winfrey televised a one hour special on his work and life which was viewed by over 15 million viewers across the nation.
