Nigel Gibson teaches postcolonial and African studies at the Institute of Liberal Arts and Interdisciplinary Studies at Emerson College. From 1997–2000 he was the assistant director of African Studies at Columbia University. He is also a Research Associate in African-American Studies at Harvard University. Dr. Gibson has spoken at the U.N. about African studies and has appeared on *The History Channel* as an expert on the Algerian national liberation struggle. His many published works include *Contested Terrains and Constructed Categories: Contemporary Africa in Focus* and *Fanon and the Postcolonial Imagination*, and the anthologies *Rethinking Fanon: The Continuing Dialogue* and *Adorno: A Critical Reader*. Professor Gibson's most recent work is *Challenging Hegemony: Social Movements and The Quest for a New Humanism in South Africa*. He is editor of the *Journal of Asian and African Studies*.
