Salvador, BRAZIL Afro-Brazilian Culture and Popular Brazilian Music

Undergraduate

6 semester hours in Latin American Studies

*early July to mid-August**

This six-week program provides exceptional opportunities for the study of Brazilian culture, civilization and music. Salvador, Bahia, the site of the program, was the first capital of Brazil. A vigorous city of nearly 3,000,000 inhabitants in northeastern Brazil, Salvador is situated between green tropical hills and broad beaches along the Atlantic Ocean and the Bay of All Saints (Baía de Todos os Santos). Salvador was the earliest and most important point of entry for Africans taken to Brazil during the Atlantic slave trade. From the 1500s to the late 1800s, a significant number of enslaved Africans, sugar, tobacco, gold and diamonds passed through Salvador, which at that time was Brazil's busiest port. This region is a major repository of African traditions and an important center for contemporary developments in Afro-Brazilian culture. Students enroll in two courses taught in English: Afro-Brazilian Culture and Popular Music in Brazil. In addition to the two courses, the program includes Portuguese language instruction during the first half of the program. Students also participate in dance and cooking workshops and have the opportunity to take classes in capoeira, the popular Afro-Brazilian martial art. Weekly field trips both in and around the city expose students to daily life in Salvador, as well as to the many vibrant cultural sites of the area. Students will meet and interact with a range of traditional leaders, community activists, artists and musicians.

San José, COSTA RICA Public Health and Development

Undergraduate and Graduate

6 semester hours in Public Health

*mid-May through June**

This program provides an exciting opportunity for students with a background in health, medicine, social work, political science, psychology, sociology, economics or international studies who want to see and experience a developing country's health concerns first hand. It is designed to give students direct hands-on experience in the Costa Rican health care system; an understanding of the country's health concerns, ranging from environmental health to occupational health hazards; and an understanding of social concerns such as domestic violence. During the first two weeks, students live with host families and engage in intensive Spanish language study near San José. Afternoon lectures and discussions are conducted by Dr. Clara Haignere of Temple University and experienced Costa Rican professionals. In the second half of the program, students live and work in rural communities where they facilitate health education workshops and activities. Workshop topics vary from year to year depending on the needs and requests of the communities. Students must be willing to live with host families in both rural and urban settings, and must be able to adapt to diverse environments. While Spanish language proficiency is not required, some Spanish language ability is strongly preferred.

Paris, FRANCE Sorbonne Study Program

Undergraduate

*Four-week program (4 semester hours in French): early July to early August**

*Six-week program (6 semester hours in French): early July to mid-August**

Temple University invites students of French to spend an unforgettable summer in Paris studying at the Sorbonne. The program offers participants the opportunity to study at one of the world's great universities, develop language skills, and make lasting friendships in a relaxed and congenial atmosphere. Courses at the Sorbonne are designed to fit individual needs, whether you are a student with basic French or a student with more experience. Large enough to provide diversity and courses of a professional quality, the Sorbonne Study Program is small enough to ensure personal contact and attention. Included with the program are three faculty-led weekend excursions to sites such as Chartres, Reims, Giverny, or the Chateaux on the Loire. Accommodation options include living in a homestay, dormitory or pension.

Leipzig, GERMANY Intensive German Language

Undergraduate

4 semester hours in German

*early June to early July**

This four-week program of intensive German language instruction is designed for undergraduates who have completed at least one semester of university-level German. Courses are taught by German faculty at the Herder Institut of the University of Leipzig, a school with over 50 years of excellence in advancing German language skills and teaching about German culture and civilization. Located in the heart of Europe in the former East Germany, the city of Leipzig has a population of more than 500,000. Leipzig is known as a city of music, the arts and, above all, science and learning. Its historic importance is reflected in its numerous magnificent buildings. In addition to tours of Leipzig, the program includes an overnight orientation in Berlin. The Herder Institut also organizes optional day trips to locations such as Dresden, Weimar, Spreewald and Saxon Switzerland, which students may take advantage of at an additional cost.

Accra, GHANA West African Civilization and Aesthetics

Undergraduate and Graduate

6 semester hours in African American Studies

*early July to mid-August**

This six-week program investigates aspects of the historical, literary and artistic bases of West African civilization. Designed for undergraduates and graduate students, it offers students the opportunity to learn about African history, politics, literature, music, dance and theater through academics and personal cultural experiences. The program is based at the University of Ghana, Legon-Accra, with courses taught by Dr. Abu Abarry, associate professor of African American Studies at Temple University. Accra, the capital of Ghana, is one of the largest administrative and commercial centers in West Africa. Students have the opportunity to visit such historic and cultural monuments as ancient slave castles, residences of Ghanaian kings, and the W.E.B. DuBois and Kwame Nkrumah Mausoleums. Field trips are also organized to familiarize participants with traditional and contemporary Ghanaian arts including storytelling, theater, woodcarving and cloth weaving.

Dhrangadhra, INDIA Art, Culture and Religion

Undergraduate and Graduate

6 semester hours in Anthropology or Asian Studies

*late May to late June**

This four-week summer program, based in the medieval desert town of Dhrangadhra, Gujarat, is intended to investigate Indian civilization through an anthropological study of its religious and artistic traditions, both ancient and contemporary. Upper-level undergraduate students and graduate students may apply. The mode of study is highly experiential and combines workshops, field trips and short apprenticeships. Each student conducts an independent field research project, focusing on an area of particular interest. Study is supervised by Dr. Jayasinhji Jhala, associate professor of anthropology at Temple University, whose lectures supplement the curriculum. Local academics, performers, artists and religious leaders also address and instruct the students. As this is an experiential learning opportunity, students with technical skills such as video making and photography; studio skills such as painting, sculpture and jewelry making; or performance skills in dance, music, theater or yoga, are encouraged to apply.

Rome, ITALY Rome Summer Session

Undergraduate

*6-8 semester hours in various disciplines; see website for details
late May to early July**

In addition to the semester study abroad program, Temple University Rome offers a six-week summer session comprised of undergraduate courses in architecture, art, art history, business, classics, dance, English, geography and urban studies, history and Italian language. Internship opportunities are also available. With the exception of Italian language courses, all instruction is in English. Included in the program are three one-day excursions, during which students explore Todi, a medieval hilltown in Umbria; Tivoli; and the Via Cassia. In addition to these full-day excursions outside of Rome, an additional feature of the Temple Rome summer program is frequent, on-site instruction for many of the courses, enabling students to study firsthand the sites, artistic treasures, traditions and business practices associated with the people and history of Italy. These visits bring academic subjects to life and further expose students to daily life in Rome. Accommodations are arranged in apartments, and a limited number of homestays are available for students interested in linguistic and cultural immersion.

St. Thomas Parish, JAMAICA International Service Learning

Undergraduate and Graduate

*6 semester hours in Education/Urban Education
late May to late June**

Located in the Parish of St. Thomas, this program focuses on international service learning, diversity and pro-poor development. Students take two integrated courses that teach them theories and practices of service learning and community development and involve them in service projects designed in partnership with community-based organizations. All students explore the history, culture, socio-economic development, and formal and non-formal (community-based) education in Jamaica, while also learning what it means to be a global citizen. In addition to four group meetings per week, students provide service three days a week at community-based sites. Past participants have come from a variety of fields including the social and behavioral sciences, education, organizational development, counseling, public health and agriculture. They have worked with women's cooperatives; students, counselors, and teachers in pre-primary and primary schools, as well as a school for pregnant teens; and agricultural extension agents. They have explored gender issues, alternative energy, conflict and violence, fair trade marketing, sustainable agriculture, art education, school discipline, as well as their own roles in creating a more equitable world. Participants are lodged in a dormitory-style facility or a guest house.

Tokyo, JAPAN Tokyo Summer Session

Undergraduate

*9-13 semester hours in various disciplines; see website for details
late May to late July**

This program, based at Temple University, Japan Campus (TUJ), offers undergraduates the opportunity to choose from a range of courses, including several focusing on Asia, and to study alongside bilingual Japanese students. Japanese language is offered at all levels, beginning through advanced. Courses are taught by distinguished faculty and, except for language courses, all instruction is in English. The TUJ academic calendar includes three semesters: fall, spring and summer. Summer session study abroad students can therefore expect to take advantage of the regular offerings, activities and resources normally found during the academic year.

Tokyo, JAPAN Studies in Japanese Popular Culture

Undergraduate

9-10 semester hours (choices include Anthropology, Asian Studies, Sociology and Japanese)

late May to late July*

Based at Temple University, Japan Campus (TUJ), this program is designed for undergraduates who wish to focus their academics on studies of Japanese popular culture. The program introduces students to various aspects of Japanese popular culture, including the inter-related fields of art, music and design, and analyzes their collective expression in mass media and youth subcultures. Course topics include anime, manga, popular culture, and youth and deviant subcultures in Japan. Students also have the option of studying Japanese language. Although courses focus particularly on contemporary popular culture, they are contextualized by broader perspectives on Japanese society and culture, with anthropological and sociological analyses of identity, media and contemporary social problems in mass society. The courses are comparative in nature and are informed by academic discourses on globalization (the diffusion of cultural innovation in popular culture) and the influence of popular culture, both in Japan and abroad. In addition to lectures and class discussions, the program includes group field trips to art and anime exhibitions, as well as a wide variety of media, art and film-related events and activities.

Tokyo, JAPAN Intensive Japanese Language

Undergraduate

8 semester hours in Japanese

late May to late July*

Based at Temple University, Japan Campus (TUJ), this program is designed for undergraduates who wish to focus on Japanese language study, either at the beginning or intermediate level. Two program tracks are available: one for absolute beginners with no prior Japanese knowledge and another for intermediate speakers. Each track is designed as a language immersion so that participants may improve their language skills rapidly over a short period of time. All students enroll in two consecutive courses, depending on their track, for a total of eight credits. Program participants must be prepared for a demanding schedule of classes, homework and mandatory field trips. An important component of the program is a set of field trips during which students experience the popular, cultural, natural and historical side of Tokyo and surrounding areas.

Tokyo, JAPAN Tyler Interdisciplinary Art Workshop

Undergraduate

9-10 semester hours (6 in Art; 3-4 in another discipline; see website for details)

late May to late July*

Based at Temple University, Japan Campus (TUJ), this rigorous program integrates theory and application through an intensive series of guest lectures, research trips, studio work and critiques. The workshop is interdisciplinary in nature, welcoming students of drawing, painting, digital printmaking and digital photography. The opportunity to engage in discussions and critiques with students from different art disciplines opens up a wide range of topics in art. During the workshop, students explore new technical methods while refining their areas of expertise. Students are expected to complete a cohesive body of work or one large-scale project that not only demonstrates a command of one's craft but in some manner incorporates the overall cultural experience as well. Students also work on a collaborative art project with a guest artist faculty member. Students have the opportunity to show their work in an exhibition at the end of the summer. In addition to the focus on art, students also take one course from TUJ's broad range of summer session course offerings.

Oviedo, SPAIN
Spanish Language, Literature and Culture

Undergraduate

6 semester hours in Spanish

*late June to early August**

This five-week program, designed for students with at least one year of university-level Spanish, is based at the University of Oviedo and is comprised of coursework in Spanish language, literature and cultural studies. Courses are taught by native Spanish professors and faculty from Temple University. Students enroll for a total of six semester hours: three semester hours of language and three semester hours of literature or cultural studies. Students spend the first several days exploring Madrid and its environs before traveling to Oviedo to begin classes. Oviedo, with a population of 220,000, is the capital of Asturias and a gateway for great scenery, outdoor activities and beaches. While the city has an impressive old-town center, museums and significant historic architectural sites, it is also a modern city featuring concerts, opera, theater and exhibitions. Students have the option of living with a Spanish host family or in a university dormitory.

Glasgow, SCOTLAND, UNITED KINGDOM
Tyler Art Workshop

Undergraduate and Graduate

6 undergraduate semester hours/3 graduate semester hours in Crafts
*early June to late June**

Note: this program is scheduled to run every other year. Contact the program director or our office for details.

The Tyler Art Workshop is a four-week studio art workshop in Scotland. The program is offered by the Crafts Department, Tyler School of Art, Temple University, in conjunction with the Glasgow School of Art. The course's structure is directed towards studio art majors with one year of studio experience beyond the freshman level. Faculty from the Glasgow School of Art and the Tyler School of Art teach intensive workshops in a variety of media, and access to Scottish artist/educators, travel and museum visits supplement the curriculum. This program emphasizes the creation of artwork based on the student's cross-cultural experiences during the program; the student's travel and research experiences are utilized as source material for creation of finished work in the final part of the program.

London and Edinburgh, ENGLAND/SCOTLAND, UNITED KINGDOM
Tyler Metals Workshop

Undergraduate and Graduate

6 undergraduate semester hours/3 graduate semester hours in Crafts
*Abroad portion: two-and-a-half weeks in June**

*Studio work in Philadelphia: early July to mid-July**

Note: this program is scheduled to run every other year. Contact the program director or our office for details.

The Tyler Metals Workshop is a two-and-a-half week studio art workshop in London and Scotland, followed by a two-week workshop in the metals/jewelry/CAD-CAM studio at Tyler School of Art in Philadelphia. The program is offered by the Crafts Department of Temple University's Tyler School of Art. The course's structure is directed towards studio art majors with a concentration in metals and jewelry with one year of studio experience beyond the freshman level. The program emphasizes the creation of artwork based on the student's cross-cultural experiences during the program; the student's travel and research experiences are utilized as source material for creation of finished work in the final part of the program. Access to English and Scottish degree exhibitions and artist/educators, travel, and museum visits supplement the curriculum.

General Summer Information

Pre-departure Information and Orientations

Pre-departure information is provided to all participants and covers such logistical issues as transportation, visas, immunizations, medical care/ insurance, as well as suggestions for preparing academically and culturally for the program. A pre-departure orientation is offered in Philadelphia, and further orientation takes place upon arrival abroad.

Passports and Visas

A passport is required for all programs. In addition, many countries require that students obtain a visa for participation in summer programs. If required for the program, information on the visa application process is provided to students after their acceptance. A passport is required as part of any visa application process, so if you do not have a valid passport, you should apply for one immediately. All students are expected to have a passport within two weeks of program acceptance. For information on obtaining a passport, visit <http://travel.state.gov/passport>.

Costs and Payment Policies

For estimated costs of each program, please refer to the relevant program description online. Detailed cost and budget information is included in the pre-departure information provided to all participants. Students admitted to a Temple study abroad program must confirm participation with a non-refundable deposit of \$200 within two weeks of acceptance to the program. For students choosing Temple-arranged housing (mandatory for some programs and optional for others; refer to the program descriptions online for specifics), a non-refundable housing deposit of \$200 is required. Both deposits are credited to the student's account. Temple University then invoices students for all remaining program charges, at which point final payment must be made. To view the summer program refund policy, please visit the Policies page within the Students section of our website.

Financial Aid and Scholarships

Students should consult with financial aid officers on their own campuses to find out what sources of aid are available to them and must apply for aid through their home institutions. Temple students should discuss available aid with Student Financial Services. Students who intend to finance all or a portion of their overseas study through financial aid funds must follow the procedures outlined on our website. These are designed to ensure that required forms are completed prior to departure.

Students from institutions other than Temple must document their awards by providing:

- Copies of the official notification letter(s). Such letters should state the amount, source, and date of availability of the award.
- The name, title, address and phone number of the person(s) responsible for the administration of each grant, loan or scholarship submitted. Also included should be the name and address of the regular financial aid officer at the student's home institution.

Note: In many cases, federal guidelines limit the types of aid available to students taking less than six credits during the summer. It may be

possible to apply for other types of aid with less than six credits, such as alternative loans. Students should confirm the rules with their home institutions.

A limited number of \$500 scholarships are available to matriculated Temple students and are awarded on the basis of academic merit and financial need. Scholarship eligibility: Applicant must be enrolled as a full-time, matriculated student at Temple University at the time of application for a scholarship; have a 3.0 cumulative grade point average; enroll as a full-time student while abroad; demonstrate financial need; and be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident.

Qualified matriculated Temple students applying to one of the summer programs based at Temple University, Japan Campus, may apply for scholarships of up to \$2,500 for the summer. Scholarship eligibility: Applicant must be a full-time, matriculated undergraduate at Temple University; be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident; demonstrate financial need; enroll as a full-time student while abroad; and have completed the equivalent of four undergraduate semesters with a cumulative GPA of 3.0. Selected finalists will be interviewed.

Temple students who meet the eligibility requirements will be considered for a scholarship if they submit their scholarship application and essay (available within the program application) by February 15.

In addition to Temple scholarships, awards administered by other organizations are available and are open to both Temple and non-Temple students. One such award is the Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship, which is designed for U.S. citizen undergraduates receiving federal Pell Grant funding at a 2-year or 4-year undergraduate college or university. Accreditation

All Temple study abroad programs, as an integral part of Temple University, are fully accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. Enrollment is open to qualified applicants from other colleges, universities and professional schools, subject to the admission criteria outlined.

Transfer of Credits

Students are advised to discuss their academic plans, the selection of courses, applicability of financial aid, and ultimate transfer of credit with their home institution prior to departure for their program. Credits earned on Temple study abroad programs are recorded on standard Temple University transcripts and may be readily transferred to other institutions.

Transcripts

Non-Temple students may arrange to have an official transcript sent to their home institution free of charge by signing the transcript release authorization on the Home College Approval Form of the application. Program Eligibility and Application Procedures

Eligibility

Eligibility for all summer programs is limited to those students who:

- possess a minimum 2.5 cumulative GPA on a 4.0 scale from all colleges/universities attended.
- are enrolled as full-time matriculated students at the time of application.
- intend a full-time program of study while abroad and will be applying credits earned toward a degree.
- are not on academic and/or disciplinary probation or warning.

Certain programs have additional eligibility requirements; please refer to the individual program descriptions online.

Students are selected mainly on the basis of their intellectual purpose and emotional maturity.

Application Requirements and Procedures

Before Beginning an Application

Please review all program-specific information, including eligibility, before beginning an application. All applicants are advised to discuss their plans to study abroad with their academic advisor. Non-Temple students should confirm study abroad procedures with their home institution before beginning an application.

Application

- **Online Application**
Navigate to the specific program's web page, and click on the "Apply Online" link found on the right side of the page to begin your application. Temple students may log in using their Temple Accessnet username and password. All other students will be prompted to create an account.
- **Paper Application**
As an alternative to the online application, students may apply with a paper application. The paper application, along with further application instructions, may be downloaded from the specific program's web page.

Application Deadline

The application cycle for summer programs opens on December 1 each year and closes on the application deadline, February 15. Completed applications, including all supporting submissions, must be received by the deadline.

The online application closes at 5:00pm Eastern Standard Time on the deadline date. Students attempting to apply online outside of this cycle by clicking the "Apply Online" link will find that the online application is unavailable and that their request to begin an application cannot be processed. Students interested in applying after the deadline should contact Education Abroad. Note that if the online portion of an application is not

complete by the deadline, the applicant will be locked out and unable to make any changes.

Students will only be allowed to continue or submit their applications after the deadline on a space-available basis. Students requesting to do this must contact Education Abroad and must be prepared to immediately submit the non-refundable \$200 program deposit, which will be refunded only if the applicant is not accepted into the program.

Submissions

Please note the following submissions are required.

- **Submissions for All Applicants:**
One academic recommendation from a faculty member who has recently taught you.
- **Additional Submissions for Non-Temple Students:**
Official transcripts from all colleges/universities attended to date. Non-Temple students who apply in December must submit an updated official transcript, with fall semester grades, to complete the review process.
Home College/University Approval Form indicating you have received approval from your home institution to study abroad on the selected program.
