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# Mosaic Transfer Guide: For Community College Partners

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Guidelines for satisfying GenEd Mosaic requirements with combinations of Transfer Courses.

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Prepared by the Office of the Senior Vice Provost for Undergraduate Studies

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The Mosaic Transfer Guide was developed as part of the transition to the General Education program which new transfer students will follow beginning the Fall 2010 semester. The Mosaic courses developed for the General Education program have replaced the Intellectual Heritage courses required for Core.

The Mosaic Guide is effective Fall 2009 allowing student's transferring prior to Fall 2010 the benefit of meeting core IH requirements using the expanded Mosaic lists.

The following courses, when accepted in transfer, can be used in combination to satisfy the Gen Ed Mosaic requirements.

*Protocols for these Mosaic Combinations:*

1. Students who transfer two courses, one from List A and one from List B can use the courses in combination to substitute for the Mosaic I requirement; in addition the courses must be from two different disciplines.
2. Students who transfer three courses, two from List A and one from List B or two from list B and one from List A can use the courses in combination to substitute for the Mosaic I and II requirements; in addition the courses must be from three different disciplines.
3. No more than one course used in combination to satisfy the Mosaic requirement can be used to satisfy another Core or GenEd area.
4. Temple Advisors will complete a DARS exception for the Mosaic requirement(s) once the student is matriculated at Temple.

**List A** - The following courses may be used in combination with a “List B” course(s) to satisfy the Mosaic requirement(s) as described in the protocols above.
